Gardening for the Future: E-Z Steps to Sustainability

Going Native: Growing Resilience in a Time of Climate Instability

Peter Henry, Owner, Dragonfly Gardens and Magic Oaks Ranch

Mr. Henry will discuss the unique ecological situation we face in Wisconsin, from the Tension Zone of our ancient past to the onset of the Anthropocene to the future of Climate Instability. And, how Native Plants are uniquely suited to help both with the mass extinction of insects and challenges posed by a broken hydrologic cycle. He will spend the later part of the presentation discussing how best to work Native Plants into the Wisconsin landscape, in yards and at larger scales.

Gardening Through the Lens of Integrated Pest Management

Kait Ryan, Horticulture Manager, Minneapolis Park & Recreation Board

Pests keep us on our toes in the garden. As we continue to increase our collective knowledge about environmental and health impacts, we have decisions to make. Does that treatment hurt those swallowtail butterflies? Will removing winter interest be worth controlling that plant bug? Can I grow my beloved peonies in my less-than-ideal side garden? This session will focus on looking at how we design, install, and maintain gardens and landscapes through the lens of integrated pest management. Dive into the mindset horticulturalists must adopt to stay on top of the challenges pests introduce!

Clear, Simple, Sustainable and Fearless Pruning Philippe Gallandat, Owner, Swiss Gardens

This session provides an overview of the best tools needed for effective pruning, and how to properly maintain, sharpen and disinfect them. Participants will learn the fundamental and basic principle of good pruning, understanding the relation between actions and reactions. General tips and timing suggestions will also be shared.
